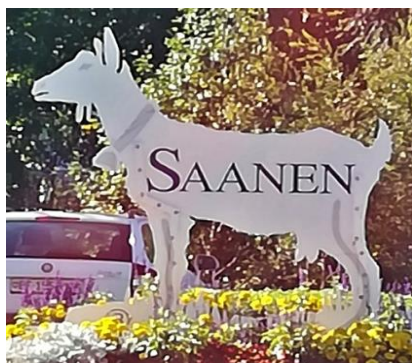

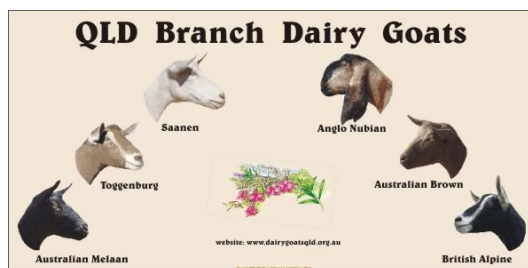

Recording milk production is easy, worth the small amount of time it takes one day per month, inexpensive and adds great value to the doe's credentials and those of her offspring.

Recording can be done as a supervised independent recording or through farmer own sampling.

An up-to-date list of approved milk testers is published on the Branch website and on page 12 and 13 of the Branch Book.

Having your own scales makes the process much easier.

Although the Queensland Branch has two sets of milk testing equipment available for loan, members are encouraged to buy their own.

Scales are reasonably inexpensive, such as those advertised on The Farmers Mailbox

website. These are 10kg capacity dial hanging scales, with 50g increments and cost about \$69.

Digital scales are also widely available, but must be calibrated in kilograms with .05 divisions (see the regulations on pg 315, 2019 Herd Book)

Most shows have a type and production class for herd recording and another for 24hr tests and are very worthwhile classes.

See page 9 & 10 of the 2020 Branch Book for getting started with Herd Recording or for booking a 24hr test.

## **Nominations for 2020/2021 Management Committee**

At the time of writing this notice to members for the July/September Newsletter, the Queensland Branch can confirm that new nominations will be called for, as not all members received forms earlier in the year. There was also some confusion with the closing date. Therefore, the committee at its meeting on July 19 moved to call for new nominations. At this stage management of the process and a timeline for nominating, voting, and holding the AGM are not confirmed.

## **Office of Fair Trading and Branch Incorporation**

Members may be aware that due to administrative errors the Branch had fallen behind in the annual payments of the fees for incorporation, with the Queensland Office of Fair Trading.

Unfortunately, the 2014 registration fee had not been paid by the management committee in charge at that time. When the 2015 payment was made to the Office of Fair Trading (OFT), unbeknown to that management committee, the OFT put the payment towards offsetting the overdue fees for 2014.

This was followed by a succession of secretaries, some with limited experience and knowledge of the requirements of the OFT, which meant that payments were missed, up to and including the current period 2019/2020. The failure to inform the OFT of change of office bearers and to make payments, while regrettable, was administrative in nature and not malicious in intent.

The matter has been rectified and the Branch has no outstanding payments. The OFT has also been advised of the recent changes to management committee.

Moving forward the management committee will ensure a process is in place to alert incoming committees of this annual requirement.

## **Ekka 2021**

On enquiry the Royal National Agricultural Association has advised the management committee that at this stage the Ekka will go ahead from 6-15<sup>th</sup> August 2021. Public holiday being 11<sup>th</sup>. However, this could change depending on how Queensland goes with COVID-19 restrictions.

Let's hope for no more COVID-19 cases and the return to a more normal world where we can all go about our business and enjoy breeding and showing dairy goats.

## Virtual Judging at the Ekka

This year the organisers of the Ekka have made it possible for the Young Judges Competition to be held, through technology and virtual judging. The chosen breed of dairy goats is the Anglo Nubian. Thanks to Jasmine, Chloe Wilson, and family for taking the time and effort to parade their animals for filming and posting on the Ekka website.

The Ekka website describes the competition in the following overview.

“The NEW Virtual Young Judges Competition presented by Arrow Energy gives aspiring judges the opportunity to showcase their budding talents. Exhibitors will partake in the judging process online through a series of images and videos.

The competition features seven categories; Stud Beef, Led Steer, Dairy Cattle, Stud Sheep, **Dairy Goats**, Horses and Poultry.

Entry is FREE and open to people aged 25 years and under, with the competition featuring a Junior Class for under 15-year-olds and a Senior Class for 15 to 25-year-olds.

The young judges will view the images and videos, ranking the animals from 1-4 based on criteria including their features and standing confirmation. The young judges will then submit their ranking online, along with a maximum three-minute video outlining their reasoning for the order.”

So, there you go Corona, there are ways to get around you so we can still enjoy showing our beautiful goats and encouraging young people to get involved!





## Queensland Judge's Training

At the end of last year and earlier this year seven DGSA members took part in the Branch Judge's Training Program. Unfortunately, the finalisation of the course has been impacted by the COVID-19 restrictions and the closure of shows.

Participants included a member from Victoria, two Queensland Branch members who undertook the course for learning purposes, as they had not satisfied the requirement of years of membership and four younger members of this Branch.

At this stage, three Queensland members have completed all course work and excelled in their written exams, two are still to do this because of the impact of the virus and complications with supervision. The exam has been amended to be an open book style, so that it is possible for them to complete this requirement.



The final, step for admission to the Victorian or Queensland panel is for the participants to co-judge at two shows and satisfy competency criteria. So, all that stands in the way of having some new cadet judges, is having shows open again.

Many thanks to the over-judges Joan Holloway and Peggy Jessen for their valuable input and sharing of knowledge and experiences with the participants. I really enjoyed working with the group, as it was positive, rewarding and refreshing in many ways. Good luck to all who are yet to complete the course.

## A Journey of a Lifetime

Saanen, the mountain village almost on top of the world, well that's how it felt to me on that freezing December morning, as I left the comfort of my snug hotel room in Montreux, Switzerland to climb aboard the Glacier Express on the day trip of a lifetime.

I remember walking from the hotel, on slippery ice-covered streets, pure white, silent flakes of the softest snow clinging to my thick black jacket and thinking how surreal this was. My whole life I had wanted to visit Switzerland, but it never seemed possible with all that happens in the everyday of surviving. However, the opportunity came along in my early retirement and I grabbed it with both hands, firstly flying into Zurich just two weeks before Christmas, 2017.

In planning the holiday my friend and I booked many rail journeys to various destinations of this most beautiful of countries. Each journey was breathtaking as we travelled from our base in Zurich to Bern, Lucerne, St Moritz, Geneva and Montreux.

It was Montreux that had me most excited, as it would be from this amazing lake front town that we would make the day trip to Saanen and back. Traversing, frozen rivers and waterfalls, the Christmas Card scenery of Fir trees bowing under the pressure of the white snow-covered branches backdropped against the steepest of hillsides, dotted with beautiful chalets, greeted us at every turn.

During the trip we moved from French speaking Montreux to German speaking villages where the train stopped to allow passengers to disembark or board for their stop along the way.

When we arrived in Saanen, the train was scheduled for about a 30 second changeover, which was not going to allow time for me to have my picture taken under the station sign. Yet, I was determined to have a record of the sign announcing that I had made it to Saanen. Despite the protests of the guard and her short, sharp whistle blowing I managed to convince her I had to have a picture taken. Begrudgingly, my mate took the snap. Not the best picture in the world, but I had on record that I had been to Saanen.



At that time of the year Saanen was quiet and most of the village was in hibernation, so we stayed on board despite the filthy looks I was copping from bemused passengers and the cranky conductor. I must have made the train late for its next scheduled stop, not a good



thing to do in Switzerland. However, in no time at all, we had arrived at the end of the line in the alpine town of Gstaad. Although there were no goats to see, the town proudly celebrates its Saanen connection including a Heidi World and some of the most beautiful souvenirs, goat's cheese, and products.

The Gstaad postcard shown here, is one that I sent to Dulcie Richards, my friend and Saanen mentor. I just wanted to share with her the magic and joy of being in this place, high in the Swiss Alps in the dead of winter.

The most amazing 'goatie' souvenirs can be found at this website; <https://gybi.ch/>. They have blue and white porcelain that costs the earth, but it is unique and lovely.

Although the home of the rich and famous, I felt I had achieved something remarkable in ticking off my bucket list a visit to Saanen, the home of this wonderful dairy goat. Remarkably, as things turned out, this wasn't to be my last visit to Saanen.

## Farm Safety

**More than 30% of workplace deaths happen on Queensland farms even though only 3% of Queenslanders live on them.**

Those of us who work on the land need to take time to think about our surroundings and our work as around 13 Queensland ag. Workers die each year and 1700 are injured due to a workplace event. [<https://www.worksafe.qld.gov.au/agsafetycampaign/home#resources>]

There are around 20 children under the age of 15 who die each year on Australian farms. [<https://www.qld.gov.au/emergency/safety/work/farm-safety>]

Take time to consider if you have the correct equipment for the job: consider the temperament or behaviour of your stock before loading them for transport or moving them for mating purposes; consider if there are overhead powerlines that will be encountered when completing a task; consider your own protection if working with hazardous chemicals; consider how you will manage your manual tasks. Most importantly, consider the safety of any children beside you.



Ensure the children have a safe play area and always wear correct restraints when in farm vehicles; do not have them ride on tractors, on the back of utes, or on quad bikes; make sure they wear helmets and suitable footwear when on bikes or horseback; keep children away from machinery.

It is important to recognise and manage the risks by identifying the hazards and the harm that may befall you or your workers. Then those risks need to be assessed and controlled to minimise and or eliminate the likely hood of that harm happening.

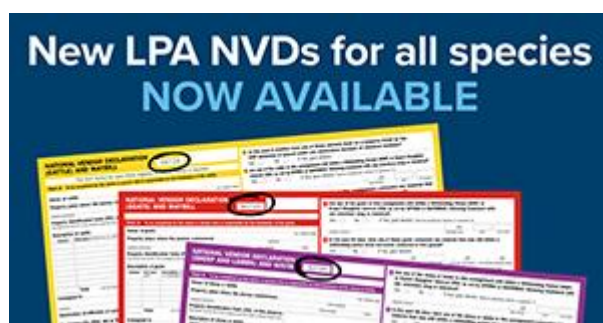
The hazards may include anything that may cause trauma, illness or damage to health [physical or mental]. Follow manufacturer's instructions for use of equipment and products. Such hazards on a goat farm may include: -

- Handling animals in the dairy, loading bays, mating yards/ animals can be unpredictable
- Use of milking machinery and spills on the dairy floor
- Sun exposure
- Handling chemicals such as drenches
- Inhalation of dusts or mould from hay and in the pens
- Loading and unloading hay and grain

Developing safe working procedures will decrease the incidence of injury to yourself, your loved ones, and others.

There is a booklet available from the Queensland Government called "Serious about farm safety" which is available for download from <https://www.worksafe.qld.gov.au/agsafetycampaign/home#resources> if you are interested in more information.

### ONE HAPPY MEMBER

So, one afternoon Raewyn Bruce, Ros and myself started trawling through my early herd books to see if we could find the member who owned that tattoo and eventually, we found them.

One old herd book had 3 goats listed in the British Alpine section with the corresponding tattoo and ear numbers 9, 11 and 12 but not 10 which was the ear number in Ros's doe. So next day Ros contacted our Federal Secretary who did a search and low and behold, Ros's doe with the ear number 10 was actually registered in App D, so Ros was able to just pay the transfer fee to transfer ownership to herself. It seemed that 'Maggie' had a small patch of white on her when registered which had since disappeared, but due to that she had to be registered in the Alpine section, but Ros was over the moon to know she was actually a registered doe with the registered name of Saraid Eliza.

The most amazing thing about all this was finding out how old Eliza was. Her birth date was 10-04-2002 making her 16 years old when Ros bought her and possible why it took 2 years to get her in kid, kidding at 18 years of age.

So this goes to prove it pays to tattoo all your goats, even if being sold to a non-member, as sometimes a person will change their minds and the join the society or, as in Ros's situation, a member can buy them and find out they are already registered and so has proven blood lines behind her.

## SHOWS AND COMPETITIONS

The Management committee is endeavouring to organise a Branch Show which will be held at Lowood Show grounds. This is dependent on the restrictions enforced regarding COVID 19. The date and other details will be made available when possible.

### Corona Virus and Shows

Recently, Queensland Health confirmed that shows can be held, providing less than 100 people attend, it is outdoors and a COVID Safety Checklist is completed and requirements displayed.

Social distancing and safe practises must be adhered to and include:

- A statement that says this is a COVID safe site
- Contact details taken for tracing purposes upon entry
- Practicing social distancing, i.e. 1.5 metres between exhibitors
- Washing hands regularly
- Following the rules and keep us all safe

This will mean that judging will look different to what we are used to, as the judge will of necessity be less hands on and mask and gloves would need to be worn for close inspection of udders in these classes. Parading and standing exhibits would require the 1.5m gap. But all of this is possible.

The regulations applicable to holding an outdoor event are:

Indoor and outdoor events  ( <i>Example – marathons, cultural festivals, fetes, expos</i> )	Must operate in accordance with the following conditions, depending on the number of people: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• <b>Fewer than 500 people</b> – must comply with a COVID Safe Event Checklist, no further approval needed.</li><li>• <b>Between 500 and 10,000 people</b> - must comply with a COVID Safe Event Plan approved by local public health units.</li><li>• <b>Over 10,000 people</b> - must comply with a <b>COVID Safe Event Plan</b> approved by the Chief Health Officer.</li></ul>	The link to the
