

Letter to the Editor

Q Fever - Summary for newsletters:

We are the Q Fever Group, a team of veterinarians and researchers based at University of Melbourne's Faculty of Veterinary and Agricultural Sciences. We are currently collaborating with industry partners to investigate Q fever in Australia. As part of this project, we are conducting surveys to better understand how common this bacterium is in our dairy goat industry. We will use this information to outline steps to help farmers and their families avoid the disease and to make recommendations to government agencies for improving biosecurity plans.

If you own or manage a dairy goat farm, it would help us tremendously if you could join our project by responding to a short survey about Q fever awareness (15 - 30 minutes) and by providing a small amount of milk from your milk vat/store for testing. Your participation will be treated as anonymous and confidential. By contributing to our research, you will provide much-needed information that will help us tackle ways to reduce Q fever risk in Australia.

BASIC GOAT NUTRITION AND THE ROLE LEGUMES PLAY final

SUMMARY ; All life and life processes on this earth are made from organic compounds.

These include carbohydrates, lipids (fats and oils) and protein. The molecules Carbon.

Hydrogen and Oxygen combine in various ways to form these compounds.

Most of the food consumed by man and animals in the world is of plant origin. Through the process of photosynthesis, plants utilise the sun's energy to combine atmospheric CO₂ and water to produce the simple sugar glucose. Complex compounds like starch, cellulose and wood are formed by combining glucose molecules with different amounts of lignin to add strength to the plant.

A symbiotic relationship with rhizobacteria allows leguminous plants to fix nitrogen from the atmosphere. The conversion of nitrogen to ammonia allows the plant to make extra protein. The diets of humans and animals benefit greatly from this special biological process. To improve the diets of ruminant animals at low cost, the planting of legume shrubs and trees is highly desirable.

Carbon should not be a "dirty" word because it is vital for our existence. Without it life would not exist. Its value continues after the death of plants and animals. The incorporation of organic matter into soils has many benefits. The soil structure and texture is enhanced, valuable nutrients including nitrogen in the form of ammonia are added and the nutrient and water retention properties of the soil are improved. Worms and microbes multiply because of the extra nutrients and provide a more enriched micro-environment through which roots can grow. Worms turn the soil over and by tunnelling they allow for better aeration of the soil. Roots need oxygen to function and a better root system means a stronger plant.

Soils high in carbon are dark in colour and are generally the most fertile. Soils in the Lockyer valley are a good example. To maintain soil structure, texture and fertility farmers sow legume crops or plants like maize or sorghum with a large bulk to plough back in to the soil.

The addition of this organic matter not only ensures the long- term productivity of the soil but helps to tie up carbon. When organic matter is left on the surface to break down, the carbon is oxidised to carbon dioxide and released back into the atmosphere where it came from.

CALCULATIONS OF FEED QUANTITIES

The calculation of feed requirements must be precise if the objective of least cost feeding for survival is to be achieved. Here are examples of how to calculate feed requirements.

Example 1

Ration – poor hay, 50% and wheat 50%.

Poor hay energy value $7 \times 50 = 3.5$
100

Wheat energy value $12 \times 50 = 6.0$ Total = 9.5
100

The 50:50 mixture will have an energy value of 9.5. Figure 1 shows that 35kg wethers will need approx. 580 gms per head per day of this mixture [290gms wheat and 290gms hay]. Include limestone in this ration.

Ration – good hay 30% and oats 70%

Good hay energy value $8.5 \times 30 = 2.6$

Oats energy value $12 \times 70 = 8.4$

This mixture has an energy value of 11. Figure 1 shows that the same 35kg wethers as in example 1 will need approx. 480gms per day composed of

Does close to kidding and lactating does may require more than 4kg grain per head per week (on paper), but there is a risk of digestive disorders if more than 3 kg is fed. The balance of their needs is best supplied by roughage such as good hay.

WHEN THE DROUGHT BREAKS

For goats that have survived dry weather and feed shortages, the period during and immediately after drought-breaking rains can be critical. In previous droughts many properties have experienced their heaviest stock losses this time.

The immediate problem is prolonged wet weather in which goats eat little or none of their grain ration, particularly when grain is fed on the ground. Their energy intake is well below the additional quantity needed. And the goats in poor condition can die before the rain stops. Boggy conditions and local flooding can prevent vehicle access to the feeding area and weak goats have real difficulty moving in such conditions. It is essential, therefore, to confine goats to feeding sites that are accessible by vehicle after rain. The alternative is to establish an emergency feed dump at the feeding site, preferable including hay, so that goats survive the rain period. Feeding areas should be well drained, and located where floodwater will not isolate any of the mob.

As soon as the first green pick emerges, goats leave their drought rations and expend a lot of energy attempting to graze. For preference, all goats should be kept in confined areas until new pasture is well established and can provide worthwhile grazing. At that point they can be gradually weaned off drought rations and allowed some grazing.

When goats change from one type of feed to another, such as from drought feeding to green pasture at the break of the drought, there is an increased risk of enterotoxaemia (pulpy kidney). Vaccinations should be up to date and a booster vaccination could be beneficial at the break of the drought.

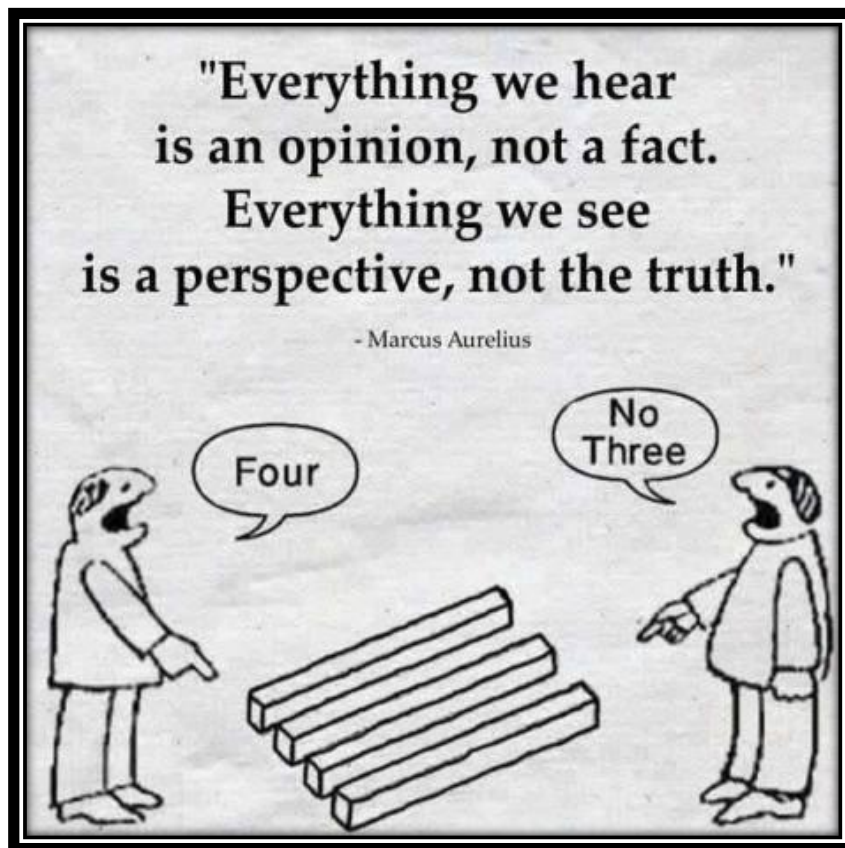
